

CHAGRIN DOCUMENTARY FILM FESTIVAL ANNOUNCES 74 SELECTED FILMS FROM 32 COUNTRIES FOR 2025

CHAGRIN FALLS, OH - The 16th annual Chagrin Documentary Film Festival (CDFF) will take place October 7-12 at walkable venues throughout the charming century Village of Chagrin Falls, Ohio and is pleased to announce the acceptance of 74 films to the 2025 Festival. Executive Director Morgan Crawford commented, "We are honored to celebrate the talented documentary filmmakers and bring people together for these remarkable stories."

Each year, CDFF showcases the best documentary films to more than 8,000 attendees, generating over \$1 million in economic impact for the local community.

The festival will kick off on Tuesday, October 7 and run through Sunday, October 12, 2025. The complete 2025 program lineup and ticketing information will be announced in early September (website: chagrinfilmfest.org). Following the in-person festival, "CDFF on Demand" will extend the experience with streaming access from October 12 at 6 pm through October 19. Screening venues include CDFF's permanent home "CDFF on the Triangle", the historic Township Hall, Chagrin Valley Little Theatre, an outdoor screen in Triangle Park and several others.

The 2025 festival launches on October 7th, presenting Colin Hanks' moving documentary *John Candy: I Like Me*.

The Chagrin Documentary Film Festival was born from the hopes and dreams of one young filmmaker. David Ponce's vision to show the world "just what the human spirit is capable of" will always be at the heart of this festival. CDFF continues to honor his legacy with its mission to educate, inspire, and connect audiences through the art of documentary film.
